LOCAL AUTHOR brings cheer to children

Everybody needs a cheerleader in their life – somebody to encourage them forward, motivate and energise them – and for local author Leanne Shea Langdown, that 'person' is Charlie.

he lead character in the Cheer Chick Charlie book series, Charlie is a 10-year-old girl who wants to be a cheerleader but, according to Leanne, the books go beyond this simple idea.

'Charlie is a girl with a really kind spirit, she is very encouraging and it is about her journey to follow her dreams while at the same time encouraging others to achieve their dreams along the way,' she said. 'Every book has a message and that message, I hope, follows the children after they've closed the cover.'

The inspiration for the books came about during a trip to the United States in 2007 when Leanne's daughter was given the opportunity to spend some time with an elementary school cheerleading squad, the Bath Lions.

Touched by the team's kind and welcoming spirit, and her daughter's enthusiasm to be a cheerleader upon returning to Australia, Leanne started a school-based cheer team at Good Shepherd Primary School in Canberra.

'Parents and teachers were coming to me saying "since so and so has started cheerleading it's changed their entire lives" because of the values we ran through it and the confidence it gave them,' Leanne said. This inspired her to create the Cheer Chick Charlie series.

Prior to writing these books, Leanne said writing was something she enjoyed but never believed she could do 'until I had children myself and I started to understand the challenges that some children have when it comes to their confidence and resilience'.

'I would formulate stories in my mind to help the kids through that and then I had the confidence in myself to transfer that to the written word,' she said.

To begin with, Leanne started

the Deep Fried Fruit blog, challenging herself to write every single day for a year 'because I fe that I needed to be able to write on cue if I really wanted to be a writer'.

She did that successfully – and the blog is still going today with daily posts – but within that experience she started writing children's books.

'I have plenty, many of them are unpublished, but the Cheer Chick Charlie books were born ou of something else. Once I started writing them, I couldn't stop – it was just flowing from me,' Leanne said.

The books are written not only to entertain but to help with confidence, resilience, health and fitness with messages including 'what may not seem possible toda could be possible tomorrow'.

Book five is due for release shortly and Leanne said she is aiming for at least 20 books in the series, with the first 12 already mapped out.



Australian author visits Cheerleaders inspire book

Leanne Shea Langdown doesn't have snow where she lives.

She doesn't run into any deer or skunks either, but occasionally she has to slow down for a kangaroo crossing the road.

Shea Langdown is from down under, and it took her 19 hours by plane and two hours by car to reach young audiences in the Northampton Area School District.

Shea Langdown spoke to students at George Wolf and Siegfried elementary schools about life in Australia and introduced them to her new series of children's books, "Cheer Chick Charlie." She also taught students the basic elements of achieving any

"You must have commitment, a spirit for it, and belief that anything is possible," she told third graders at Siegfried earlier this month.

The author and business owner was most excited about meeting with the Bath Lions cheerleading squad. It was the kindness and welcoming spirit of this group of cheerleaders back in 2007 that planted the seed for Shea Langdown and her family to take cheerleading back to Australia. Their visit gave them the inspiration to create a school-based squad in Canberra.

While in the U.S. to attend a wedding, Shea Langdown's daughter, Tahlia, a third-grader at the time, attended a Bath-East Allen cheerleading practice. When the pair arrived home, Shea langdown's daughter said to her, "Mummy, it's my dream to be a cheerleader."

Since cheerleading was an uncommon sport in Australia, there were no opportunities for her daughter.

"What may not seem possible today could be possible tomorrow," she told her daughter.

And so, Shea Langdown founded the Good Shepherd Primary School cheer team in 2008. Using the Internet, books and DVDs, she created the cheering uniform. The squad won trophies at its first competition. She coached for four years in all age groups.

There are now 100 competitive cheerleaders in that school and Shea Langdown is the squads' principal adviser.

From that, Shea Langdown created "Cheer Chick Charlie" to show that anything is possible. With Charlie now being introduced to the U.S. via the New York Toy Fair this month, and with possibilities of U.S.-based publishing deals, an animated series and contracts with major U.S. retailers,

THE children's book series 'Cheer Chick Charlie' has been launched by former Goulburn woman, and Canberra-based author, Leanne Shea Langdown.

The series invites children aged 7-11 into the life of 10-yearold Charlie, who dreams of being a cheerleader, as she cartwheels and leaps through adventures that take her from home to school to cheerleading competitions and even overseas'.

Ms Langdown, 40, was born and brought up in Goulburn, ittending Goulburn rimary School, and also the ormer girls high school, Marian ollege.

She then moved to Canberra nd attended university there. ie is involved in cheerleading real life, as coach and foundmember of the Good epherd Primary School eerleading team since 2008. he is also the Canberra ison for the 'Sirens cheerling squad, with offices in berra and Townsville, a

'Cheer Chick Charlie' was inspired by her daughter Tahlia, 12, who had a desire to become a cheerleader, and together, Leanne and Tahlia started a school squad.

This is where Charlie was 'born', and grew, as Leanne describes, ' from the spirit of each and every one of the cheerleaders'.

An animated version of Charlie was also created by students from the Academy of Interactive Entertainment in

Canberra, in partnership with the Canberra Institute of Technology (CIT).

Ms Langdown has also been working in partnership with both Canberra and regional school librarians to run 'author talks' for students in Canberra, Goulburn, Yass, Cooma and Batemans Bay.

The first two books in the series were showcased at the launch on June 26, at the Canberra Business Point head quarters in the Canberra sub urb of Braddon.

Batemans Bay.


"I have also been working with Canberra and regional school librarians about author talks for students in Canberra, Goulburn, Yass, Cooma and Batemans Bay," she said.

LEANNE Shea Langdown says her new series of short novels surrounding a young girl called Cheer Chick Charlie is a culmination of work she's done over the past few years as a mum, cheerleading coach and life coach.

"At some point it hit me like a tonne of bricks that everything I had been doing; the coaching with adults, as well as the cheerleading, as well as all the books I had written in the past was all coming together," she said.

"[Charlie] was inspired by all three of our children, but particularly around [my 12-year-old daughter] Tahlia's want for becoming a cheerleader and it has grown from there.

"There is a little bit of every cheerleader that I have come across in Charlie. So that's where the inspiration came from.

"And when I sat down to write book one, it just poured out of me. And then book two and book three, which is waiting to be printed."

Leanne said the books are suitable for children aged five to eight. Charlie wasn't about the "razzle dazzle" of cheerleading on the sidelines; the character was based on confidence, resilience and fitness.

"I didn't realise how big this cheerleading thing could be, I knew that I wanted to [coach cheerleading] to help kids' confidence," she said.

"They are little girls, they have body image issues so early now that they compare themselves to the other kids, they might look different, but instead of embracing that they kind-of beat themselves up over it.

"And I thought, cheerleader! Only the most popular and the most beautiful and the most talented in the movies get to be the cheerleader – but everybody can be that person."

Along with a line of merchandise with inspirational messages, Leanne has started an interactive website; working with the Academy of Interactive Entertainment to create an animated version of Charlie.

The Canberra Institute of Technology recorded the voice of Charlie – voiced by Leanne's daughter Tahlia.

And each month "Cheer Chicks" – a group of young, local cheerleaders – will be featured in a short health and fitness video that will be uploaded on the website.

Leanne, a mother of three, who had her first children's book "My Happy Gift" printed in the US last year, said the venture was helped through the ACT Government Innovation Connect program and also workshops through Canberra BusinessPoint.

She came up with the idea for Charlie after a brief stint in the United States had her then eight-year-old daughter obsessing over the sport of cheerleading. Upon returning to Australia and discovering a lack of cheerleading programs in the ACT, Shea Langdon started one at her daughter's school – much like Charlie's mum does in the books.

"The books aren't just about cheerleading, but encouraging kids to be cheerleaders for each other. There are so many little people out there who could use a bit of a boost," Shea Langdon said. "Charlie helps children with their confidence. No matter who they are or what their abilities are, they all have something special inside them."

Books 1-4 will be available nationally by Christmas, while lucky Canberrans can already find up to book seven in local bookshops.

YWCA Canberra program recognised



But with his passion came a price, he has been continually teased, mocked and bullied for doing cheerleading being continually told that cheer is a girls sport and because he is doing it he must be a girl or he must like boys. The guilt he felt for wanting to do something that kids and parents alike told him wasn't a boys sport has taken a toll on his confidence but it hasn't once wavered his desire to continue to do cheer. It was heartbreaking to hear how cruel kids can be, every week he would come home from school and talk about what other kids were saying and doing to him for doing cheer. After hearing from Mason about how people teased him we asked him if he still wanted to do cheer he said "Yes I don't ever want it give it up. Besides if I gave it up, they would just find something else to tease me about" wise words for an 11 year old.

This sport that he has come so passionate about has now inspired his sister Kyja to take up the sport too. Last year was her first year of cheer at Heat cheerleading at the age of 4, she now shares that passion for cheer. In the middle of last year Leanne asked Mason if he would like to start a partner stunt group. Leanne had been thinking about getting Mason a partner stunt but hadn't quite found someone for him to do it with but now that Kyja has been doing cheer they should do it together. Last year they competed in a cross squad calibration partner stunt and the ACT state championships. They only had 5 coached training sessions before states and ended up coming third and qualified for AASCF Nationals! They were so excited and we were so proud. So we made the trip to Melbourne for them to perform. In watching them take the stage the pride and emotion took over. The look that Kyja gave Mason just before the music started and how Mason was such a stable base for her was amazing. And when they finished, Kyja jumped on Mason and he carried her off the stage, this brought tears to our eyes. Watching them perform that day was one of the highlights of our lives.



Being only 11 and continuing to do something that you are passionate in the face of adversity is pretty inspiring, to motivate people to continue to do what they love is so inspiring in fact my husband and I have joined a stunt team and may be performing this year. His passion inspires me and as an adult to have an 11 year old inspire me it pretty amazing.

She left the Department of Agriculture, where she had been a long-serving executive assistant, and became a stay-at-home mum who was wondering what she could do beyond the domestic boundaries of the home.

At that time her daughter said she wanted to become a cheerleader. Ms Shea Langdown knew little about dance but she started a 14-member cheerleading squad at her daughter's primary school which has now grown to hundreds of participants each year - she is still involved even though her daughter has left the school.

Ms Shea Langdown has since self-published a series of <u>Cheer Chick Charlie children's books</u> - there has even been interest from overseas about buying the rights to use her Charlie character - and she has started her own "success consultancy" primarily but not solely targeted at giving advice to executive assistants.

"I don't really like the phrase 'life coach'," she said.



Cheer Chick Charlie by Leanne Shea Langdown

Above and Beyond is the latest book in the children's series featuring 10yr old (wannabe cheerleader) Charlie Chance, her family and her besties Bella and Laura.

Ostensibly the book is about a father-daughter camping trip... something which freaks Charlie out a little as her own father has to pull out at the last minute. So, it's not only the first time she's tried camping, but also the first time she's been away from her family for a few nights.

Thankfully she's with friends and their fathers but the unexpected inclusion of an older 'troubled' boy complicates things.

It gives Charlie a chance however, to put into practice something her father's talked about... the need to go 'above and beyond' the call of duty in order to help others.

The lesson's pretty obvious to this 47 year old, but the message is spelled out a number of times throughout the book which targets 7-11 year olds.



I liked the fact that this book—indeed this series—by Leanne Shea Langdown educates as well as entertains. Leanne explains that each book has an inspirational theme.

I'm a success consultant (life coach) and I am always amazed that adults don't have access to some of basic motivational tips and tricks. I figured it would be great for children to absorb these at a grass roots level.

Above and Beyond is the seventh in the Cheer Chick Charlie series, inspired by Leanne's own daughter's dream to become a cheerleader. As it's still a fledgling sport in Australia, Leanne was involved in starting a squad at her daughter's school seven years ago.

I discovered that the sport was not only helping kids with their team work, fitness and health, but the values we threaded through it was also helping with their confidence, resilience and enthusiasm.

Obviously I'm no expert in children's literature (or anything really...) but the books seem ideal for pre-teens. The books are all about 100-130 pages in length and feature large (14 font) print—perfect for young eyes. Or older eyes after several pre-bedtime wines!

Charlie could easily morph into a smug 'too good to be true' caricature, but she's written in a way that it's impossible not to like her honesty and positive outlook.

Leanne does a good job of sharing Charlie's thoughts (her hopes and fears) in a way that seems comforting to young readers. When Charlie is chastised by her friend's father for wandering off she gets upset before rationalising it...

"Be calm, she said to herself. It's OK, you're not really in trouble. They were just worried about you. They're right. You should have told someone where you were going. They're not being mean. They're just being parents." p39

Similarly when Charlie talks to her mother via phone and tells her she's homesick Mrs Chance is able to tell her that it's normal to get homesick and that adults do as well.

There are actually a few messages in *Above and Beyond*, including the fact that success doesn't always involve winning the prize. As I said, these are obvious to adults but undoubtedly more subtle when applied to young minds.

Other themes to feature in the series include: being committed and believing your dreams are possible; recognising that we all have unique strengths; and a reminder that facing challenges and/or difficult people can mean we ultimately become braver and stronger as a result.

From a commercial and marketing point of view, I'm impressed at series' branding; and my book arrived with a postcard and wristband. Leanne explains this is to help readers remember what Charlie learned in that particular story.



The <u>Cheer Chick Charlie website</u> is also a great resource for kids and the adults in their lives. There are puzzles to download and games to play. And for the kids there's... #joking

There's also some great Cheer Chick Charlie and cheerleading merchandise available on the site, as well as information about author events and how to buy the books. Even better there's an app to download which will apparently help me (ahem) youngsters learn to be a cheerleader.

Leanne says that kids as young as 5 are enjoying the books and she gets a lot of testimonials from parents who say Charlie is a great fix for children who've had a hard day. After all, she says...

I think we all need cheerleaders in our life. People to motivate, inspire, encourage and support.
